“A Cleveland in Carbondale” - the Final Chapter

Vicar Jeff Burgess presents on his vicarage year in Illinois
and looks ahead to his call to a congregation.

You're invited to a special evening with Jeff to hear about his vicarage in Illinois and what lies ahead as he and Bailey prepare for his call to a congregation.

This past year, Jeff Burgess has served as a “Vicar” at Our Savior Lutheran Church in Carbondale, Illinois. It will be wonderful to hear about his experiences in serving God's people under the mentorship of an experienced pastor.

“The Vicar and St. Paul”

Jeff's presentation is an important moment in our life together here at St. Paul. **The Elders and Executive Board have been exploring the role a Vicar might play in the ministry here among us.** Now it's time to expand that conversation to include you, and the whole Body of Christ here at St. Paul, so that we can see the full picture of what a vicarage program at St. Paul might mean for our ministry.

What is a vicar?

A “Vicar” is a student studying to be a pastor in The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Part-way through his studies (usually the third year) he is assigned to a congregation for twelve months (called a “vicarage” because he works “vicariously” for the mentor-pastor).

What does a vicar do while on “vicarage”?

The vicarage is something like an apprenticeship. He (and his family) join the life of the congregation where they are assigned. Working under the guidance and mentoring of the parish pastor, the Vicar gains hands-on experience in every aspect of the work of the pastor and congregation.

Do congregations benefit from hosting vicars?

The blessings flow both ways. While the vicar hones his pastoral skills, the congregation is blessed to receive his service in teaching, visitation, preaching, leading worship, and even taking leadership roles in some aspects of the congregation's life together. Pastor and the Vicar will be able to work together to expand parts of our ministry here at St. Paul.

What does it cost to host a vicar?

Congregations provide daily bread for the Vicar and his family. This includes housing, a monthly stipend (paycheck), mileage and professional expenses, assistance with health insurance premiums, and basic cost of moving to and from the vicarage.

Why should we host a vicar?

The Church needs pastors who are well trained and who have grown in ministry as they prepare for work in a congregation. St. Paul is the kind of vibrant and healthy congregation that will encourage and invigorate future pastors. The Church needs more congregations like St. Paul and we can be part of revitalizing congregations for service by being a positive part of forming servants in Jesus Christ. This makes our vicarage program a true mission effort. It is being part of something bigger than our four walls. It makes us part of all that God's people are doing to share the Gospel.

How do we move forward?

If this is part of the mission and ministry of St. Paul, we will make provision for the vicarage program in our yearly budget. Then, we will complete a vicarage application and submit it to the seminaries. In the spring we will be notified if we will be receiving a vicar. If so, then we can begin making plans to welcome our new vicar.

What's my next action?

- Prayerfully consider the opportunities hosting a vicar will provide our congregation and community.
- Talk with your brothers and sisters in Christ here at St. Paul about your thoughts.
- Be informed and encourage others to be informed. (Pastor and Elders are available to you!)
- Plan to attend Jeff Burgess' presentation on Friday, October 9, 7:00pm. You can hear first-hand about being a vicar.
- Generously support the work of the congregation so that we have the resources to be good hosts of a vicar.
- Come and vote at the November Voters' meeting.

Last month I reflected a bit on the past year and all the blessings God has given to us and how much He has used us as His ambassadors of the Gospel in our community. We are certainly enjoying a time of great happenings in our life together at St. Paul.

To name a few:

- The Women's Retreat was attended by more than thirty women, representing six congregations.
- Brothers in Christ (our men's group) enjoys monthly fellowship and study.
- On Wednesdays we're going to Paul's Epistles, starting with 1st Corinthians
- On Sundays we're going to walk through the Old Testament books, tracing the history of God's people and His mighty acts for them.
- Our Sunday School is blessed with caring teachers who are doing a wonderful job teaching our children about God's love for them.
- We've equipped our families with tools to nurture the faith in their homes (newborn-grade 4: "Story Bible"; grade 5: "Faith Alive" Bible; grade 7: catechism). If you'd like these resources for your home, contact the church office.
- The Youth Group is preparing to attend a summer youth gathering in 2016.
- Jeff and Bailey Burgess have been blessed with your generous support as they enter their final year at seminary, preparing to be placed into a congregation this coming spring. (On October 9, come and hear about their year!)
- The Body of Christ at St. Paul has grown as we continue to invite our friends, family, neighbors, and coworkers to come and worship with us. God has used us to baptize adults, children, and infants and we've welcomed new members through confirmation, transfer, and reaffirmation of their faith.
- We connect with our community through dinners, the Christmas Tea, choirs, and the like.
- Members of the community have been blessed and sustained in their physical needs through the Food Bank.
- We've been able to relieve the physical and spiritual suffering of people around our community through generous works of service and support and the pastoral care I've been privileged to offer you and them.

The list could go on and on! Thanks be to God and to Him be the glory!

Thanks also to each of you whom God has used to make all these things possible. With our own unique skills and abilities, sometimes with our faithful prayers and generous support, and other times simply with our encouragement and participation, God has brought us together as the Body of Christ to bring the Gospel to one another, our community, and even far beyond.

THE PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

The Prayer shawl ministry has returned and is once again on the move. What is a prayer shawl? It is a hand crocheted, knitted, or quilted shawl; scarf; lap robe; or baby blanket that is presented to individuals as a heartfelt gift to let them know that they are in our thoughts and prayers. It is more than just a garment. It begins with a prayer that whoever receives this shawl will feel less alone, whatever their situation.

What is a prayer shawl ministry? It is an out-reach ministry intended to provide additional care and support for people in our congregation, our families, and in our neighborhoods. The purpose of this ministry is to touch the lives of those in need of prayer for care, support, and life's celebrations.

Participation is easy. Some will choose to prayerfully knit, crochet, or quilt for people in need of prayer. These crafters will select and use their own supplies or those provided by the prayer shawl ministry. Others will choose to prayerfully create the thinking-of-you cards that will be attached to each item. Additional folks will make it a point to pray for the participants and recipients of the shawls, scarves, lap robes, or baby blankets.

Most often the prayer shawls will be distributed by Pastor Zielinski during his pastoral visits.

This ministry has just gotten a grant from Thrivent. This will help with the cost of yarn and supplies, and enable our ministry to grow and reach more people.

We are thankful and so ready to start our work. If you can knit, crochet, quilt or write a note to accompany the shawl, please join us.
