Asphalt does not hold up as well as concrete, but we hope we are good for a few more years before we need to put a 2 inch asphalt layer on top of existing surface.

The garage roof has been in need of repair and a number of bids are being evaluated to re-shingle the roof.

Also on the schedule will be a complete carpet cleaning of the Narthex and Fellowship Hall. After many dinners, breakfasts and events, it is time to get it professionally cleaned.

A tremendous effort, led by Dave and Judy Scaife replaced the old worn fence on the north hill. This was an Eagle Scout project by their son many years ago and has served its purpose well. It was a big endeavor and the crew of Kyle Bremke, Alan Smith, Dave & Judy Scaife, Dean Bremke, Scott Wiesemann, Don Gotsch and Tim Scaife who helped install a nice looking split-rail fence to enhance the front of the church.

Our sincere thanks to Carl and Chris Strekely for the work on re-setting pavers and re-finishing the bench again at the front of the cemetery. A beautiful job on both and the flowers look great.

As things always seem to happen at the wrong time, on a Sunday in July, it was found there was no hot water in the bathrooms due to a failing hot water tank. Not sure who to thank for shutting off the water and mopping up the basement floor, but Rob Zacharias was the advocate who installed a new tank, hopefully good for another 20 years.

As usual, Dave Knopf has kept the lawns, landscaping, and property looking in tip top shape. Bob Heffinger, as our Sexton has helped a great deal in leveling grave sites, preparing foundations for headstones and managing the cemetery. We thank them both.

We hope you have noticed the new brass railing that will help our members approach the altar with more ease and safety. This rail can be easily removed for choir concerts or other rites at the altar and can then be re-inserted as needed.

This information is confidential and is seen by only the nurses who will be monitoring your results and your physician. Even if you are seeing the nurse for a "quick check", filling out this form will help us monitor any changes. We know that high Blood Pressure
