Generations: God's Grace in Every Age September 18-19, 2015

One generation shall commend Your works to another, and shall declare Your mighty acts.
Psalm 145:4

Walking through the cemetery, I'm amazed to see gravestones from almost 175 years ago. Our parents in the faith saved and worked and built because they knew someone (YOU!) would need to hear the Gospel right here just like they needed to hear it back then. They commended God's works to the next generation and to the next and to the next and then to us. We know the mighty acts of God because of the generations who have come before.

On any given Sunday at St. Paul you'll see brothers and sisters in Christ from younger than 9-weeks to older than 90-years. Song and Service Book and our Hymnal

From the Elders:

The yellow Song and Service Book was developed when we were transitioning from The Lutheran Hymnal (red book) to the current Lutheran Service Book (LSB) hymnal. The intent was to include hymns that were not in the LSB and maintain liturgies that we were accustomed to. The yellow song book was intended to be temporary and eventually be phased out. Due to convenience, we extended the use of the song and service book longer than originally intended.

The Elders have decided that the yellow song and service book can be retired in the near future (this summer). After reviewing the liturgies and hymns available in the LSB and those contained in the Song and Service Book there are equivalent—if not the same—liturgies in the LSB, and many hymns as well. The Elders have asked Pastor to outline these similarities for you. Hymns that are not in the LSB but are favorites of the congregation can be inserted into the weekly bulletin when the Worship Committee selects them.

The Elders understand that retiring the Song and Service Book may be difficult for some of the congregation since it has been in the pews for many years. Fortunately, as we continue in our worship life together we will still enjoy the hymns and liturgies that we all know and love.

A comparison and guide:

From Pastor Zielinski:

As we prepare to retire the Song and Service Book (SSB), the Elders have asked me to walk you through an analysis of the similarities between the hymns and liturgies we have in the SSB and our regular hymnal, Lutheran Service Book (LSB).

Liturgies: These are the six liturgies in the SSB: Matins, Morning Worship, Vespers, Evening Worship, Prayer at the Close of Day (Compline), and Holy Communion

Matins and Vespers are in the hymnal in the form you may be familiar with from The Lutheran Hymnal (red hymnal). Compline, though seldom used, is also in the hymnal. Any of the five settings of Holy Communion could be used like the one in SSB.

That leaves us with “Morning Worship” and “Evening Worship.” Unique features of these two services include reciting the 10 Commandments and Luther’s Morning/Evening Prayer. These elements are nicely wrapped into the “Service of Prayer and Preaching” (p. 260ff). We’re going to give this service a try during the summer.

Hymns:

The Song and Service Book has 66 hymns. After analyzing their use over the past six years, here are a few notes:

10 were never used.

22 were used 4 or more times in six years (5 of which are in our hymnal)

13 hymns appear in our new hymnal

All the remaining hymns remain available for our use. When the Worship Committee chooses to use one of them, we simply can check if it is in the public domain or, if we need to, we can pay for a one-time copyright permission which is only a few dollars.

Currently we are paying several hundred dollars a year for 6 hymns to be printed in the SSB (because we are keeping copies in the pews). Only 2 of these were used more than four times in six years. Removing the SSB from the pews and only paying for hymns when we use them will free up ministry resources for other work.

Finally, to highlight a few other benefits: We will gain extra space in each row as you won’t have to worry about sitting on the books. By using the liturgies compiled in the hymnal we will gain a consistency in language from service to service, and beyond our congregation, together with other congregations who also use the hymnal. Hopefully our visitors will find it helpful to use a familiar hymnal (and not have to juggle two books sometimes).

I appreciate that the Elders have been sensitive to those of us who may have grown “attached” to the SSB. Hopefully you’ve been helped by seeing the similarities with our hymnal and by knowing that the hymns and songs we use most frequently are still at our fingertips.

As we receive God’s gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation, our worship is carried along by the familiar music and texts that have sustained the Church for generations. We are blessed to have vibrant musical leadership here at St. Paul and talented musicians who love to lead us in song and bring us God’s Word in the music of choirs, bells, and instruments. Thanks be to God for His gifts and for our life together as the Body of Christ!

Spring cleaning day was a big success although we spent more time on the outside due to the weather being so accommodating. A big part of the morning was spent on the grounds and Memorial Garden, if you have not walked back there lately, take a look at how nice it appears thanks to the efforts of your fellow members.

Also completed this month was the mapping out of plots for the internment of cremains in the Memorial Garden. We now have 160 plots available. These plots are 3'x 3' and will accommodate a 2'x 2 flat stone marker. These plots can accommodate up to two separate family members. Members can either choose a plot and a stone marker for internment or the ashes can be scattered in the garden and a stone marker can be purchased by the family if desired. There will be costs involved to open and close the grave for the cremains and also for a solid liner to hold the urn inside. The cemetery regulations are being revised to include scattering of ashes and internment of cremains. Please contact the church secretary if you have ashes of a family member and wish to inter them in the cemetery.

By June 1, all cemetery decorations will be removed from the cemetery to allow for lawn mowing during the summer. If you wish to reuse your decorations or wreaths, please remove them at this time.

In the coming months, the Trustees will revisit either expanding our security system or installing video and intercom ability at the front door. Either course of action will provide a history of church access and improve safety and security.

how to pack your shoebox

1 SHOEBOX

Use an empty cardboard or plastic shoebox (average size). You can wrap the box and lid separately, but wrapping is not required.

2 BOY OR GIRL

Decide whether your gift will be for a boy or a girl, and the age category: 2-4, 5-9, or 10-14.

3 FILL WITH GIFTS

Fill the box with a variety of quality gifts that will bring delight to a child (see Gift Suggestions).

4 INCLUDE \$7 AND SHIPPING LABEL

A donation of \$7 per box is critical to transport your gift and deliver it into the hands of a child in need.

Standard Shipping Label: Donate \$7 per box by check to Samaritan's Purse (note "OCC" on the memo line) and place it in an envelope on top of the items inside your shoebox. Print and cut out an appropriate boy/girl label from page 2 of this PDF download. Mark the correct age category and tape the label to the top of your box.*

Follow-Your-Box Shipping Label: Donate your \$7 online and discover the destination of your shoebox. We'll email you a special Follow-Your-Box label to print and use. Later, you'll receive a notification about the destination of your shoebox gift.

5 PRAY

Ask God to use your gifts to show His love to the child who will receive your shoebox.

6 DROP OFF

ALL AGES

TOYS! Start with a central item that a child will cherish, like a beautiful doll, a deflated soccer ball with pump, or a plush stuffed animal. Then add quality items like cars, musical instruments, puzzles, jump ropes, etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES such as pencils, pens, crayons, notebooks, coloring books, etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS such as toothbrushes, bar soap, washcloths, combs, etc.

ACCESSORIES such as socks, hats, t-shirts, flip-flops, hair bands, sunglasses, etc.

A PERSONAL NOTE and photo of you and your family/group. If you include your name and address, the child may be able to write back.

YOUNGER CHILDREN:

Blankets, sticker and picture books, blocks, finger puppets, pages of colorful stickers.

OLDER CHILDREN:

Small tools, tape measures, sewing kits, fabric squares, etc; deflated balls with pumps and needles; solar calculators, rulers, scissors; jewelry; deodorant
