## Singing and Making Music in the Lord...

Every month, some of your brothers and sisters in Christ meet with Pastor Zielinski and together we plan the worship services of our congregation. How do they do it? (Or, maybe some of you might ask, "What are they thinking!?!") Here's a glimpse into the work of the Worship Committee and the principals we use as we prayerfully plan our worship life. Please pray for the work of the Worship Committee, giving thanks to God that He has blessed us with a faithful and vibrant worship life together.

**Ephesians 5:18–21 (ESV)** — "...but be filled with the Spirit, <sup>19</sup> addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with your heart, <sup>20</sup> giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, <sup>21</sup> submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ."

Every time we come together to worship as the Body of Christ, we join together in song. Our services are punctuated by the "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs" of which St. Paul wrote to the Ephesian church.<sup>1</sup>

But, which ones should we sing?

The full body of hymns and songs used in congregations throughout history would be impossible to collect. From every culture and time period, the people of God have added their voice to the choir of all the faithful by writing music and texts to proclaim the mighty acts of God. Some of these hymns have stood the test of time and are known all throughout the church. Others, have found familiar homes within particular traditions or cultures. Still others have gained popularity, but their content (musically or in text) are contrary to the truths of Scripture or offer a weak confession of the faith, and so are avoided or simply cast away. Finally, there are hymns—although obscure in some circles—that are truly classics and are worth the effort to learn because of their rich content, or historical significance.

Our hymnal numbers 966 hymns. Add to that number the beloved hymns from previous hymnals and ones still being written and we have well over 1000 songs to pick from every time we come together to worship. Most you are familiar with. Others are worth learning. Some, are favorites here but not other places and vice versa. Where do we even try to begin?

Enter, The Worship Committee. Over the last few years, Kathy Fargo, Martha Konzelman, Ray Miller, Karen Myers, and David Spry have faithfully and lovingly worked together to coordinate the worship of the congregation. First, during the vacancy, it was vital that someone with knowledge of the congregation's worship life select hymns and liturgies that would nurture the faith of everyone who worshipped together here. Upon the arrival of Pastor Zielinski, he asked the Worship Committee to continue their work with him, valuing their experience and knowledge. The makeup of the team may change from time to time, but its importance and goals remain the same. Please take the time to thank them for their work and encourage them in their labors.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> What did he mean by these? Indeed "psalms" meant the book of Psalms. "Hymns" were likely portions of music set to music (like we have today in the "Nunc Dimittis," "Magnificat," and others). "Spiritual Songs" were works of poetry, set to music, that declare truths of Scripture, prayers, or other images of the faith; what we would know as "hymns" today.

Here's how we approach planning a service:

- Where are we in the Church year? What is the overall theme of the day?
- "Opening Hymn" Introduces the congregation to the day's theme. Hymns with "movement" or energy usher the congregation into a ready mindset of worship.
- "Hymn of the Day" (also called "Sermon Hymn" or "Office Hymn") usually speaks most strongly to the particular theme driven by the Gospel reading, the other readings, and the day of the Church Year.
- "Distribution Hymns" Sung while the Lord's Supper is distributed to the congregation, these hymns flow from the theme of the day/season or focus on the Lord's Supper in particular. Since the amount of singing depends on how many people are receiving communion, there may be two or three hymns.
- Other hymns: "Canticles" are portions of scripture set to music that fit into particular services. These are usually the same each time the liturgy is used, but sometimes are omitted or substituted (during Lent, for example).
- "Closing Hymn" Since this hymn gets the "last word," it is important that it flow logically from the rest of the service. Leaving worship with a melody in your head, an uplifting text, or a tune with energy and motion propels the congregation to go forth in joy with the gifts of God's Word and Sacraments received today.

#### Why pick one hymn or another?

We use a worship planning guide that has helpfully compiled hymns from our hymnal that coordinate with that particular day's readings or time of the church year (also offering suggestions for choirs, hand bells, and other music). It's a good place to start, but doesn't take into account our individual identity. Looking at the hymns, the Worship Committee gets to work: Does the congregation know it? When did we sing it last? Are there others that fit better?

When looking at a new, or unfamiliar hymn, the committee takes many things into consideration: Is the tune new or not? Is it "sing-able"? Have we done it before? What is the history of the hymn? Is it one we "should" know or learn? Can it be introduced by a choir or solo? Where does it fit in the service? Then, we look over the hymns and try to include more hymns that are already familiar in proportion to hymns we are still learning. (Sometimes more successfully than other times. Do be gracious and forgiving when a particular service isn't your cup of tea. The person sitting next to you may have just found a new favorite!)

#### What can I do?

Give thanks to God for the Worship Committee's commitment to planning worship services that strengthen your faith and reinforce the truths of God's Word. We're always open to suggestions, remembering that we are "giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Eph. 5). We are also "submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ." What is familiar and beloved to one of us may very well be new to someone else. We might be missing out on some great hymns if we don't give it a try. (I think of "Life High the Cross" and "Thy Strong Word" as great examples; really, every hymn was new sometime, and every hymn was once new to you sometime too.)

When you face an unfamiliar hymn or song, you might find it helpful to remember that the Worship Committee who picked it are your brothers and sisters in Christ who genuinely love you and that they have taken a lot of care to put together a service that is familiar, faithful, vibrant, and full of joy. So, with that in mind, think to yourself, "The committee chose this for a reason, and knowing it's unfamiliar, they chose it anyway. I trust them, so maybe I can give it a try. What does the text say and how does it fit today? Is this a hymn that many other Christians or Lutherans already know and now I get to learn it too?"

As a family of God we come from many different backgrounds. That's a big reason we worship using our hymnal. Lutherans from all over the United States—and the world!—can join us in worship and find familiar songs and liturgies. It is good for us to expand our repertoire and so have even more ways to sing our faith and prayers. It connects us to our brothers and sisters in Christ beyond our walls. We also treasure what is most faithful and familiar and rejoice that through God's gift of music, He has placed true words about Himself deep into our souls. I look forward to singing God's praises with you again soon.

# Lent 2016: "Places of the Passion"

Week after week, we will enter the Places of the Passion and see our Lord . . . waiting for us . . . willing to share with us a love that was set in place before the foundations of the world.

Plan to come to our Lenten services this year. Prepare to enter into these places of devotion, for there, your Lord will meet you, sharing with you His wondrous love that saves a fallen world.

## **OVERVIEW OF GROUPS FOR 2015 AND GOALS FOR 2016**

#### LWML

Our Service Projects are divided in 4 areas:

Collection for Stuff the Bus (missed the start of school collections)

Clothing Collections and assisting at BHITC clothing closet (generous donations by congregation provided 3 cars/trucks of clothing for Building Hope in the City.

"Judea" (Ohio)

Collection of mites (monthly with the help of the congregation)

Preparing Flood Buckets (buckets sent to Lutheran Disaster Relief)

Collect Christmas Toys & Wrapping Paper for HARP (generous donations with the help of the congregation) Maintain relationship with William Graske at Bethesda Home (correspondence with Bill and remembrances at is Birthday and Christmas maintained.

"Ends of the World" (International)

Making Personal Care Kits (done and delivered)
Christmas Shoe Boxes (done and delivered to Samaritan's Purse)

WOW! Thanks to everyone for helping us meet our goals! In addition, LWML also sponsored bake sales, hosted the annual Christmas Tea, Father's Day Ice Cream Social, and fall campfire/vespers. We assisted with the Multigenerational Women's retreat, helped St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Vermilion with snow removal costs, made donations to Guidestone, to Christopher Milo's Leadership anti-bullying, Suicide Solution Program, to Lorain-Medina LWML zone, and toward a clergy weather coat. LWML donated two chaffing servers to the St. Paul kitchen, prepared and delivered lunch to the volunteers at the VanSickle's house on the church work day. Pastor shared some of his Liberia experiences and Margit shared a "perfect cup of tea" with us, LWML women also help with the Prayer Shawl Ministry and St. Paul Quilting. WOW again! We had a fruitful year "Serving the Lord with Gladness".

#### TRUSTEE

#### **Parking lots**

• Parking lots are showing some wear, we are looking at some repairs and resealing the parking lots in 2016, cost estimates are between \$3,500 and \$4,700.

#### 1414 Lester Road

In 2015, the 'new parsonage' property was sold after plenty of work and expense to bring it up to a
marketable condition. 90% of the proceeds were placed against our current mortgage on the
Fellowship Hall. The remaining 10% will be distributed among Lutheran charities.

#### 1411 Lester Road

• The old parsonage remains occupied and tenants are current on rent. Last inspections in October verified boiler, smoke alarms and other areas are in working order.

#### Church

- Property and liability insurance is up to date.
- Furnaces, HVAC, water heaters, kitchen equipment all seem to be in good working order. Some of the A/C units needed new control boards this year and was a substantial expense.
- Internet services and WIFI installed and working well.
- A new copier was needed and leased in 2015 to replace the network printer. Estimated annual cost is \$2,400 with service agreement.
- Fire, motion, and smoke alarms have been tested twice this year with no problems. Fire extinguishers have been inspected and when needed have been replaced.
- New outside lighting was installed along church entrance.
- New LED lighting was installed at entrance way and part of the Narthex, project is ongoing.
- Last winter's temperatures and heavy ice on the roof caused a number of leaks, fixed by Trustees and volunteers, but will need to install additional roof vents. Additional insulation was added.

#### **Normal Upkeep and Maintenance**

- Normal cleaning and upkeep by the custodian and Trustees are ongoing.
- Snow plowing awarded to current vendor for 2015/2016 winter, salt costs have gone up again.
- Landscaping services awarded to current vendor due to excellent service and pricing.
- Dehumidifier replaced in church basement.

#### **Memorial Garden**

- Approximately 160 cremation plots have been plotted in the Memorial Garden.
- A number of cremains were interred in the Memorial Garden in 2015.

#### **Project list for 2016 includes:**

- A full electrical audit that has been on our agenda for a while. Determine breaker needs, labeling of all circuits and load balancing.
- Spring clean-up day for entire church, Fellowship Hall and classrooms planned for May 7, 2016.
- New counter/desk/storage space for pc that controls the electronic sign on Center Road
- Complete replacing all fluorescent/ballast lighting in Narthex with LED fixtures.
- Trustees are investigating video cameras for church entrance and parking lot.
- Additional roof vents for Fellowship Hall.

The Trustees are very thankful of the volunteer efforts of many in the congregation in 2015 and look for additional help in the coming year as projects develop. Respectfully submitted, Don Gotsch, John Johnson, Scott Weisman, Matt Bosela, and Kyle Bremke.

Our high school students are continuing to enjoy serving coffee and pastries to our congregation before their class begins. Our Christmas program was a tremendous success with our children telling the story of Jesus's birth. Thanks to Mrs. Sara Zielinski for directing the program along with Ray Miller and Alice Typak for providing their musical talents.

In 2016 the Sunday School classes will be starting a pen pal relationship with the mission group that Victoria Becker is working with. We are preparing for Easter with excitement. Our high school class will host an Easter egg hunt for our primary grades. Further information will be forthcoming. We will continue to focus on prayer and learn about serving and tithing.


