Extending the Mission of St. Paul

The Mission Fund / Alaska / Local Projects

Jesus said, "You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." Acts 1:8

When Jesus was about to ascend into heaven, 40 days after His resurrection from the dead, He made it clear to His disciples that they were going to be the ones to carry the Gospel into all the world. He tells them that they will be the witnesses who will give the first-hand accounts of what God has accomplished for everyone. This wasn't just going to be a message for Jews or people living in Jerusalem or Israel. The message was going to go far beyond one location, nation, or people. The Gospel was going out into all the world. Like a pebble dropped into still waters, the message of Jesus' work would radiate outward; beginning with Jerusalem and having no limits. They would be His witnesses in Jerusalem, then outward into Judea and Samaria, and further still into all the earth.

Our congregation, as the Body of Christ and the people of God, has inherited this mission of God and the calling to witness to the Gospel of salvation in Jesus Christ. Each and every congregation is another pebble dropped into the waters of their particular location. From Valley City, the ripples of God's work radiate outward from us, locally—and beyond! Just like the disciples would begin in Jerusalem and go outward into all the earth, our congregation has a witness to bear right here in our community—AND into all the earth, beyond our local community.

The Mission Fund

When the "new parsonage" was sold, \$10,000 was set aside for use outside our congregation as something of a tithe on the income from the sale. (In this way, the congregation has modeled what being a generous and cheerful giver from the blessings God gives each of us.) After careful consideration, the Executive Board has established with those funds a permanent "Mission Fund" to provide subsidy and seed-money for mission trips and projects that place us in witness and relationship with our community and beyond.

We could have used these funds to simply write checks to organizations that do mission work and care for our neighbor. But, we would be missing out on the opportunity to personally connect with the people impacted by our generosity. There is a tremendous blessing in working face-to-face as a witness to the Gospel of Jesus. Just like the best parents spend time with their children face-to-face, we give the best witness to the Gospel face-to-face.

Growing the Fund: The Mission Fund is like a "memorial fund" or "building fund" that can receive contributions from individual members (check your envelopes for ones labeled "Missions" or "Special"). You can designate gifts and offerings to go specifically to the mission fund and they will be used accordingly.

Using the Fund: The fund has two purposes: Mission Trips and Mission Projects. The Board of Evangelism will be where projects and trips get going. Have an idea? Talk with Dave Hesketh or Pastor Zielinski.

Expenditures from the fund will be to supplement mission projects and mission trips which support the congregation's outward focus of bringing the Gospel and God's mercy to our neighbors, near and far. In particular, mission trips and projects supplemented by the Mission Fund will have a significant face-to-face component that will place participants into direct relationship with those impacted by the work done on the trip or in the project. The Mission Fund will be utilized after other forms of fundraising and support have been used.

Mission Trips: Participants in a Mission Trip will be expected to pay no less (but maybe more) than 1/3 of the individual cost of the trip. This is an important step in committing yourself to a trip. Participants need a "stake" in the success of raising funds and promoting the trip. Then, through fundraising, congregational campaigns, door offerings, endowment, etc. the team will raise funds for the rest of the money. Finally, depending on funds available, the Mission Fund will round out the costs. Ideally, this would divide the costs into 1/3rds and give the congregation the opportunity to show their support as well.

Mission Projects: Sometimes opportunities just need some seed money get things rolling. The Mission Fund can serve as a catalyst to get a larger project off the ground. To give the congregation and individuals the opportunity to show their support, the Mission Fund could support up to 2/3 of a project in the first year, but only 1/3 in subsequent years. If the idea takes off and gains traction, then we can put it in the budget or commit fundraisers and door offerings to it. If it's just not a good fit or the right time, we can move on to another opportunity.

If you'd like to see a copy of the guidelines for the Mission Fund, they will be available at the Welcome Center for a few weeks, or contact the church office.

Alaska Mission Trip 2017

We've had strong interest in the Alaska Mission Trip! We have a couple individuals signed up and I know several others have been waiting to see what kind of support will be available from the congregation. The individual cost will be about \$1500. \$500 will first come from participants. That leaves \$1000 to raise per participant. We'll need a team of 8-10 individuals, so let's say we need \$10,000 still. Between the German Dinner and the Mission Fund, we've raised \$7,600. Will you help to finish the job?

The team will depart June 23, VBS goes from June 26-30, and then the team is free to return home or travel on their own and explore beautiful Alaska.

SPOTS ARE STILL AVAILABLE! You can be a part of a life-changing experience as you show the children of Chugiak and Wasilla how much God loves them and how much St. Paul cares that they know Jesus. We're willing to go to great lengths to be sure they hear about Jesus because without our help, who will tell them?


Local Mission Projects





After struggling over medical assistance to end their patients' lives, some physicians are having second thoughts. Many doctors in Canada who initially signed up to provide lethal injections or medication for their patients have found the act "simply too distressing," according to Jeff Blackmer, the Canadian Medical Association's VP of Medical Professionalism. "... we're seeing doctors who go through one experience and it's just overwhelming, it's too difficult, and those are the ones who say, 'Take my name off the list. I can't do any more." Canada's Medical Aid in Dying (MAID) law went into effect last June, officially legalizing euthanasia in the country. The list of 137 physicians in Ontario willing to participate in MAID continues to get shorter. At least 24 doctors in Ontario have already asked to be removed from the listing and another 30 have opted out temporarily. Meanwhile, the College of Physicians and Surgeon of Ontario (CPSO) has stated that doctors who oppose euthanasia must provide patients with "an effective referral" to a "non-objecting" physician who will kill their patient. The Coalition for HealthCare and Conscience is challenging the CPSO's policy to protect conscience rights for all medical personnel. 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Transhumanism (Luke 20:34-38) by Rev. Michael Salemink

"[T]hey cannot die anymore, because they are equal to the angels and are sons of God, being sons of the resurrection." (Luke 20:36)

Transhumanism seeks to convert us into superhuman beings. Transhumanists support enhancing human abilities beyond natural limitations. The movement advocates applying technological advancements to expand memory and computation, improve immunity and endurance, and heighten consciousness. Transhumanism claims as its strategies and successes artificial intelligence, assisted reproductive technologies, and genetic engineering. It pursues direct participation in our own evolution until man-machine symbiosis produces an immortal, omnipotent species supplementing or supplanting humanity.

Sounds like science fiction. Smells like science sinfulness. Transhumanism tells the same old story of human hubris. It promises we can become like God and build a tower into heaven. However sophisticated, salvation sought from our works always begins in selfishness and ends in death. This "advancement" of humanity idolizes technology and inevitably leads to the annihilation of humankind.

Transhumanism rightly recognizes that forces beyond our control threaten suffering and destruction. But it overlooks how our own sinful motivations must sabotage anything we attempt.

Jesus has not come to rescue us from being human. God's Son instead restores our humanity. He made man in His own image. He saw that we were very good. He will not abandon His original creation. He indicates this joyous, hopeful truth by fully sharing in our humanness, including living with limitations, suffering, and dying. Jesus redeems our servanthood not by seizing immortality and wielding omnipotence but by self-giving. His resurrection from the dead and ascension in human flesh confirms His love and salvation of human beings. In Holy Communion's body and blood, we share in the heaven everlasting of Him who united His divine life to us in substance and spirit. So we neither lust after machines' might nor fear it. We find our fulfillment in Christ.
